Personal, Social & Emotional

Communication & Language

We will be having lots of conversations with the children about their home life, families and friends. We will ask them questions and their opinions about things. We will also introduce lots of new vocabulary linked to our learning environment.

Physical Development

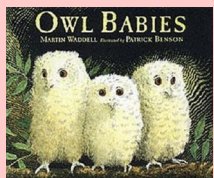
We will provide the children with lots of opportunities for developing their core body strength, these will include running, use of adventure playground, bikes and scooters. We will start weekly PE sessions after half term.

They will also have access to lots of activities to strengthen their fingers in preparation for writing and they will practise writing their name.

English

Very soon the children will begin their phonics lessons. They will start with phase 2.

In the meantime we are focusing on oral blending and initial sounds.

Understanding the World

We will talk about past events and present events. We will begin to look for and talk about seasonal changes.

We will start using our onsite wooded area on a weekly basis.

We will be doing lots of singing, dancing and learning nursery rhymes.

Supporting your child with their learning

Listening to your child read, is the next best thing you can do to support their learning, playing 'I spy' or Simon Says, as well as enjoying stories together.
